Handa's Suprise Friut Counting


During the activity, the children guessed which fruits were in Handa's basket and discussed which animals took each one. They then counted how many fruits were left in the basket, confidently identifying and counting each fruit, saying: "One pineapple, five apples, four oranges, and two tangerines."

The children acted out parts of the story, using sequencing language such as "first, then, and now." They also engaged in a counting game where they gave fruit to Sana according to her requests for example, "Can you give me three apples?" and the children responded, "One, two, three - three apples."

The children demonstrated strong number recognition and counting skills, as well as an understanding of quantity and sequencing. They were enthusiastic and focused throughout the activity, showing developing confidence in using mathematical and storytelling language within their play.


















Children's comments:



Handa's Suprise Smoothie

Following the story Handa's Surprise, the children took part in a hands-on cooking activity to make their own fruit smoothies. Together, they looked at the different fruits from the story such as bananas, oranges, pineapples, and tangerines and talked about their colours, textures, and tastes.

The children helped to prepare the fruit by peeling, chopping (with support), and adding the pieces into the blender. They counted how many pieces of fruit went in and predicted what colour the smoothie might be. As the blender mixed the fruit, the children were excited to watch the change in texture and listen to the sound it made.

Afterwards, everyone had the chance to taste the smoothie and share their thoughts — some children said it was "sweet," "cold," or "yummy." The activity encouraged language development, turn-taking, and the use of mathematical and descriptive vocabulary.
